David Cotton writes: I found the following newspaper clippings re. the death of Alan Donald Appleby from Lake Entrance, which is in the far south east of Victoria, New South Wales. One of the notices is from the R.S.L. (Returned Servicemen's League) so one as-

sumes he was in the 2nd world war therefore

"Suddenly on May 1, 1997 Alan Donald (Don) Appleby, of Bairnsdale formerly of Lake Entrance - loved brother of Anne & Peggy (USA)"

"Donald Allan Appleby VX148860 58/59 Btn. The President and Members of the Lake Entrance RSL mourn the loss of member, Don. Sincere condolences to the Appleby family"

"The funeral of Mr. Alan Donald Appleby of Bairnsdale, formerly of Lake Entrance will be held at our chapel, 30 Victoria St., Bairnsdale at 10.00am on Wednesday, 7 May 1997. Private cremation. H.W. Baggs & Son. Bairnsdale."

AMERICAN HERO

Simeon Applebee was born about 1744, in Berwick, Mass. USA.

He enlisted as a private in Captain Philip Hubbard's company during the conflict with the British to establish American Independence during the War of the Revolution. He served in that company from 1 September 1776 for 2 months and 13 days he being stationed at Kittery Point and Old York.

In 1777 he enlisted, again as a private in Captain Samuel Grant's company in Col. Storer's regt. from 14 August until discharged on 30 November 1777, thus serving for 4 months and 3 days with the Northern Army. Her was discharged at Dueman's Heights.

His final service in the war was with Capt. John Goodwin's company; major Daniel Littlefields' (York Co.) regt. from 10 July 1779 until 10 Sept. 1779. Service for 2 months.

He married Bridget Lord on 17 Dec 1784, and they had a son John Applebee a year or two latter. John married Olive Linscott on Independence day (4 July) 1808.

Simeon Appleby died in 1843 at North Berwick, Mass.

Mr J A Hilton has written to say that in 1844 Henry Appleby took over the "Dering Arms" public house at Pluckley, Kent (where the TV series "The Darling Buds of May" was filmed)

In the tradition of the times he would invite the local Gentry to his opening dinner so that they could gauge his ability to cook and serve a good dinner, bearing in mind the uses made of a village pub in those times.

The following announcement was published in the Maidstone Journal 18 June 1844 Page 2 Col.C:

HENRY APPLEBY begs to inform his friends and the public generally that he intends to give his OPENING DINNER in the newly creeted booth on the Pleasure Grounds on Thursday, June 27th, and respectfully solicits the favour of their company, when he will use every endeavour to contribute to their comfort and amusement.

Professional Vocal and Instrumental performers will be in attendance.

Tickets 2s. Each."

UK 1891 CENSUS

RIPON PARISH REGISTER.

John Hebden a former chairman of the Guild of One-Name Studies writes that, having recently under another hat, published on microfiche the registers of Ripon Minster, now the Cathedral. He says that it was easy to do, as a friend put them in *strict* alphabetical order with a computer programme. The printout is over 2,000 pages and there is an index to marriage witnesses. Dates with some unfillable gaps are

Christenings:1672-1855, Marriages: 1576- Jun. 1837 and Burials: 1574 - 1881.

1851 CENSUS INDEX

The East Yorkshire Family History Society has published an index of the 1851 census for Scarborough (HO107/2368 - 129V - 609V).

We now have a copy of all the Appleby names listed with ages and place of birth, which we shall be happy to search for members with ancestors from that area.

The place of birth includes as well as Scarborough, Pickering, Acomb, Filey, Whitby, and one person, Sarah Appleby aged 27 from Yarmouth, Norfolk.

An index has also been published for villages around Scarborough, such as Muston,

Gristhorpe, Flixton, Folkton, W & E Flotmanby, Harwooddale, Brompton, Snainton, East Ayton, and Sherburn, all of which we now have a copy.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this twenty fifth day of August one thousand nine hundred and twenty one.
