

Joseph Appleby Ltd

We also heard from Maureen Surman who began working for Joseph Appleby Limited in 1978, six years after Appleby Edmonds was sold to Automotive Products.

Maureen writes: "Some years ago, it may have been ten, someone researching their family history did contact Automotive Products and we were able to pass on a large picture which, if memory serves me right, was to do with a scroll being presented either to Joseph Appleby or George

Edwin Appleby

The following is taken from THE MARIN INDEPENDENT JOURNAL of San Rafael California dated 7 March 2000

Edwin "Captain Ned" Appleby, a former Marin County resident died February 9th in his Hawaii home. Born in Marin in 1927, Mr Appleby was raised in Mill Valley. He was a graduate of Park School and Tamalpais High School. He attended Santa Rosa Junior College, San Francisco State University and College of Marin.

He was best known as a musician and performed in many bands, including COM-Tam Dance Bands, Sky Blue Band and Dale Alstrom Quartet. He organised and directed the Cascade Chorale, sang with the College of Marin Chorus and other professional groups.

Mr. Appleby was known for his Hawaiian shirts and captain's hat. In the 1970's, when he joined a rock group "The Beefy Reds" he earned the sobriquet "Captain Ned of the Beefy Reds" and became known as "Captain Red"

He toured for may years as a ship's musician in the American President Cruise Lines. He toured with the Jack "Jive" Schaffer organisation around the United States and Canada, and played the trumpet, trombone and bass. He also dabbled in comedy.

His musical speciality was jazz, and he performed with the

Lionel Hampton Orchestra. In the 1980's he organised a Sunday afternoon jam session at pier 23 on San Francisco called "Captain Nedd and the Jazz Buccaneers". He also performed at the Traditional Jazz Festival in Sacramento with the "Jazz Buccaneers"

He returned to California last August to perform at the Jazz Festival at Big Bear Lake with the "Nani Maui Token Haole Jazz Band" He also appeared in last years Fairfax Jazz Festival.

He was a lifelong sailor who began sailing in Mill Valley with the Sea Scouts program in the 1930's. He was active in racing on the bay and was a past member of the Sausilito Cruising Club.

He was a life master and certified instructor-director in Bridge. He taught the game on board the American Presidents Lines when he was not playing music.

At the time of his death he was working on a publication of a new bridge system. He is survived by his wife, Ann, of Texas, and an extended family in California and Hawaii. Friends are invited to a musical celebration of Ned's life at 5.00pm March 26th at 19 Broadway in Fairfax.

Carnage at

Harriston.

The following report is from the Fayette Chronicle, dated 3 October 1913:

Willie Jones, an eighteen year old mulatto boy, started on a murder rampage in Harriston Sunday morning between one and two o'clock and wreaked savage carnage on both White and Negro people whom he encountered

He was armed with a double-barrel shot gun and supplied with a quantity of buckshot shells, and the net result of his deadly aim in given in the following summary of killed and wounded.

The dead:

Sheriff Groves B. Hammett Constable Frank Kinstley

Claude Freeman, Teller Warren, Johanna Aiken, Homer Aiken, Fayette Grayson and Joe Weeks.

The wounded:

Edward B. APPLEBY, conductor on Y. & M. V.

Railroad, shot through left lung, shoulder and groin.

O.S. Gillis, Circuit Judge, Jefferson County, shot in right shoulder and chin.

Thad Ross of Harriston, flesh wound to hand.

W. D.Dennis of Harriston, shot in hand and leg.

Purnell Lee, railroad yardman.

William McCaleb shot in back.

William Bond, flagman on Y & M. V. Railroad, shot in leg and thigh.

Reynolds Kinstley, railroad clerk.

Al Aiken, negro

John Wiggins, negro, right eye shot out and scalp wound.

John Nash, negro

Dewey Haywood, negro, shot in abdomen, may die.

Bob Patterson, negro and C. S. Hill negro.

Just how the shooting began and the sequence of events is hard to get straight, but the widespread impression that the trouble was anything resembling a "race war" is about as far from the truth as any versatile reporter could have gotten.

It is agreed that the shooting began as a negro house, where Willie Jones had some trouble with two other Negroes, whom he shot, at the same time shooting a woman.

From there he proceeded to the village and shot everyone whom he saw, indiscriminately, with the exception of Shaw Millsaps, a Harriston merchant, whom he called to the door and asked for a drink of water, and whom he warned to stay inside.

After killing the Negroes he deliberately went to the house of Constable Kinstley, called him to the door and shot him dead. He next encountered Claude S. Freeman, who was on the street,

waiting for a train to come from Favette, whom he shot and who lay in the throes of death, with his cries of anguish and pleadings for help unanswered. After killing Freeman he shot into the Kinnison Restaurant, killed a negro on the gallery of the Restaurant, and shot up Conductor Appleby, William McCaleb, Flagman Bonds and others, and it is at about this time that vague statements connected to the older brother, Walter Jones, with the shooting, one or two persons declaring that shots were coming from several directions at the same time.

Some time later Sheriff Hammett and others proceeded to the home of the two boys, with the expectation of finding them there and taking them into custody. When near the house the Sheriff was fired upon and killed by Willie Jones who had concealed himself under a corner of a building nearby, and who emptied the other barrel of his gun at Mr. Gillis, dangerously wounding him.

Mr. Dennis ran up the railroad track and concealed himself for a short time and encountered the murderer when he came round a building, both fired and each of them were wounded., and the Negro's wild murder-career effectual stopped.
