In addition, an article about his quest appeared in The Evening Gazette newspaper; the Hurworth Web Site put a BIG piece about him on their Webpage (WWW.hitc.co.uk); the local landlord was actively asking patrons for information, and all together it became something of a community project!

Erie Co. Pennsylvania.

John Abel was born in Columbia Co. N.Y. and came to Erie City, Pennsylvania in 1839 when he was eleven years old. He began his present occupation in the meat market on State Street with his father when he was fifteen, and when twenty-four, established himself in his present business, with which he has since been successfully identified.

He was united in marriage, in harbor Creek Township in 1861 with Josephine, daughter of Thomas and Sarah Appleby, pioneers of Erie County. Mr & Mrs Abel have one daughter living - Nellie Laura, a literary and classical graduate; and a son and daughter deceased (John Webb and Zillah), who are buried in the Erie Cemetery. Mr Abell has been a member of the Masonic fraternity for 16 years and a Knight Templar for 13 years. He and his wife are earnest members of the Presbyterian Church.

How to get beyond a dead end.

Don't ignore State or Country Census returns. Look for the people who lived nearby. Often close relatives moved from one place to another in groups. The parents of your "End of line" person may be right down the street from them.

Census returns for the British Isles (except Ireland) are available for 1851, 1861 1871, 1881 and 1891. They show street by street the members of each household, their relationship to its head, ages, occupations and birthplace. The 1841 census is also available, but does not show relationships or place of birth.

The 1881 census has been indexed by surname, and is available at many libraries, and is also available to purchase. The ARO has a copy of the 1881 census index, and we shall be happy to make a search for you, upon request with a stamped reply envelope, or 2 IRC's.

Erie Co. Pennsylvania.

A. J.Culbertson, foreman painter was born 24 Sep. 1832 in Buffalo, New York, USA. He came to Erie with his parents James and Betsy (Huntley) Culbertson in 1841, received his education in Erie Academy and learned his trade, that of painter. He was engaged in mercantile business from 1856 to 1859; went to Colorado in 1861, remaining three years, them to Montana for three years, then commenced work in the E. & P. R. R. shops in Erie. He has been now fifteen years so employed, eleven as foreman. Mr. Culbertson was united in marriage, in 1855, with Laura R. Applebee, daughter of Thomas Applebee, of Harbor Creek Township, this County. In politics, our subject is a Republican. Source: Samuel P. Bates, History of Erie County, Pennsylvania ARO/Doc/466

We came across a brief entry about a murder in 1952, either of Herbert Appleby or by Herbert Appleby! filed in the Public Record Office at Kew, under reference ASSI 45/125. It contains records of the Justices of Assize, Gaol delivery, Oyer & Teminer and Nisi Prius. ARO/Doc/467

1901 UK Census.

The 1901 census returns will be made available for public consultation on the first working day of January 2002 in the UK and world-wide.

An index that allows the user to access and navigate the data more flexibly and readily than traditional means will be available. Further elements beyond name and place may be searchable and/or shown in the information returned from a search. The images and index will be available over the Internet and also online at institutions including the Family Record Centre in London.

1891 Pilot. Another key element of the project is a pilot using the 1891 returns for Norfolk. This should be available over the Internet this Spring. This will give users the opportunity to help the PRO test various parts of the service as part of the pilot.

United States WW1 Civilian Draft Register.

The US Civilian Draft register for World War One, contains 1,215,381 records and details 141,114 different surnames of all registrants born from 1872 until 1900 from about 15% of US counties. From this list the ARO has extracted all the Appleby entries (a total of 87).

We were delighted to receive a most enthusiastic e-mail message from Kim Appleby in the USA, who has recently begun researching her husbands Appleby ancestors. Her goal is to create a family tree for her 3 year old son (what a great idea)

Having joined the ARO we were able to help her get started, with information on Edward Appleby, a locksmith from Willenhall in Staffordshire (b. 1843) and now she tells us that she has actually traced her descendants back to Humphrey Appleby around 1637, but needs to verify her findings.

APPLEBY, F. C.....KOLYI

We believe that KOLYI is an abbreviation for "Kings Own Light Yorkshire Infantry" but we stand to be corrected if this is incorrect. Is this hero of the second World War, from your family?

Mystery Writer Dies.

Laurali Rose Appleby was born 5 June 1939 in Saskatoon, Sask. Canada. Daughter of Sidney Appleby & Evelyn Barber. Known as "Bunny" she always wanted to be a writer. Her parents suggested she became a journalist so she could earn a living while she wrote.

She married actor and director John Wright on 6 January 1962 and had two daughters, Katey and Johanna in 1964 and 1966.

She thrived on journalism, but knew she wanted to write fiction full time. Her first novel, "Neighbours" was published in 1979 and won the Search for a New Alberta Novelist competition.

Writing under her married name as J. R. Wright she has had success after success as a mystery writer, with an international reputation. Her novels have been published in Britain, Germany, France, Denmark, Italy, Norway, Japan, Spain and Sweden.

In an interview several years ago with *The Vancouver Sun* Ms. Wright said she never intended to get into a life of crime, but it just happened that way.

Her 1995 book *Mother Love* gained her the Crime Writers of Canada Arthur Ellis Award for best novel and the Canadian Authors' Literary Award for Fiction.

Ms Wright was often compared to British authors Ruth Rendall and P. D. James for her focus on the psychological motivation of her characters.
