Private Herbert Alfred Appleby.

Private Appleby was the son of Walter and Elizabeth Appleby of Dedham, Essex; husband of Ethel Appleby of Dedham. Whilst serving with the 5th Bn., Suffolk Regiment he died aged 36 on Wednesday, 20th October 1943.

Buried in grave reference 2. A. 51. At the Kanchanaburi War Cemetery in Thailand, 129 kilometres west-north-west of Bangkok. The cemetery is in the perpetual care of the Commonwealth War Grave Commission. "Their name liveth for evermore"

Catherine Appleby.

Born about 1851, and described as "a little servant girl" was charged with stealing from her master in Ratcliff. Catherine's brother Alfred Appleby of Edward Street, Dorset Square, Marylebone apprehended the girl and gave her to the authorities. Reported in the East London Observer in the 1860's.

Ardleigh, Essex, 1796

In 1796, John Kelly, the Vicar of Ardleigh, wrote "In consequence of the avowed intention of the French to make a descent upon this coast, as communicated by the Ministers of Parliament, I have thought it my duty to number my parishioners, which I have done by a domiciliary visitation; that in the event of an actual invasion, such a list may be useful, either to assemble us in order to make a resistance, or in case of dispersion, to enable us, upon return, to discover and ascertain our respective claims and settlements."

He listed 1145 parishioners, by name, quality and age including the following:

786 Sarah Appleby, servant, 15

902 John Appleby, husbandman, 30

903 Margaret Appleby, wife, 40

Postal Directory 1827.

Robsons Postal Directory of 1827 included the following entry:

List of Hoy (a barge like craft) services from London to local ports. From Browns Wharf (London) to Thorpe, Kirby, Clacton, Tendring and Colchester, Essex. One of these Hoys is the "SUTTON" whose captain was Captain C. Appleby.

Darlington Cordwainers circa 1600

Extract from "The Leather Industry from 1600 - Darlington" by Gillian Cookson:

"The 1574 agreement periodically reaffirmed with a free dinner of the Company, was signed by master Cordwainers and by one representative of the curriers. In 1698 nine Cordwainers signed or made their mark: Thomas Hall, Christopher Simpson, William Perkins, John Trueman, Robert Weemes, John Willson, Michael Appleby and Robert Brownless, along with the currier Robert Hall and the borough bailiff Richard Hilton. There were only six signatories in 1710 and 1711, Weemes, Simpson and Appleby as before, along with John Loftus, William Lainge and Lawrence Ridsdale, with Thomas Hall as Currier.

Many of the apprentices recorded involve pauper children. A widow's son Christopher Nesham was sent to **Michael Appleby** in 1701 under threat of a penalty of £5 should he fail to perform his duty.
