I am trying to trace Ernest Appleby who served in the Durham Light Infantry during the Boer War (1899-1902) He was wounded and returned to England. Later he went to Canada then returned to England and rejoined his regiment and served during the First World War.

William Appleby from Leeds.

William Appleby born in Leeds, Yorkshire about 1823, father Thomas, joined the East India Company's Artillery in 1843. He was an unusual soldier, as he left the army and became Superintendent of the Punjab Agricultural & Horticultural Society's gardens at Lahore. He married Maria RENWICK in 1848 and they had four children. The youngest of these was Arthur Dawkins Appleby, who was the Postmaster in Simla in 1904. Arthur married Margaret Mary Livingstone in 1879 and they had 8 children. EQ340

H.M.S. Victory

John Appleby aged 24 born in Yorkshire, Ordinary Seaman.

Ship's Pay Book No. SB426 11th May 1803 to 31 July 1804

Landsman. Volunteer 1 August 1804 to 15 January 1806

Was at Trafalgar rated Ordinary Seaman.

Then served on H.M.S. Ocean, built in 1805, 2nd rat, (98) and scrapped in 1875 ADM36/15900

H.M.S. Swiftsure.

Thompson Appleby aged 33 born in Brunswick, Able Seaman. Ship's Pay Book No. SB40723 October 1804 to 20 July 1804 (from Utrecht)

Built in 1804, 3rd rate (74) at Bucklers Hard. Used till 1845 then used as a target and scrapped ADM 36/16549

H.M.S. Spartiate. John Appleby aged 27 born in Bristol, Gloucestershire, Able Seaman.

Ship's Pay Book No. SB 168 16 June 1804

Taken as a prize at the Nile, 1798 and scrapped in 1857.

Joseph Appleby. The will of Joseh Appleby late of St Michael Mile End in the County of Essex, farmer who died 2 January 1872 at Mile End, was proved 19 February 1872 at Ipswich by Thomas Moy of Colchester in the said County of Essex Coal Merchant and James Joseph Smith of Colchester, merchants clerk, the grandson, the executors.

George Appleby. The will of George Appleby late of 40 Middlesex Street, Somers Town, Pancras, gntleman, who died 31 December 1874. Proved by Susannah Appleby of the above address widow relict, sole executor (effects under £450)

Henry Appleby. Administration with will efects of Henry Appleby late of 59 Cannonbury Road, Islingon and 53 Paternoster Row in the city of Lndon, engraver, died 26 December 1874 at Canonbury Road. Granted at Principal Registry to Frederick Robert Appleby of 185 Offord Road, Islinton, engraver, son, one of residuary legatees substituted. (Effects under £600)

Alexander Bradford Appleby

This is an extract from the Nevada State Journal Newspaper, published in Reno and dated Wednesday, May 8th 1912.

"Alexander Bradford Appleby against Mary Marmion



Alexander Bradford Appleby told a peculiar story of desertion. He came from a place near Montreal and said that his business required absence from home and that his wife left him after they were married but five weeks, and she never gave her address. The property rights were settled through attorneys, he giving a check for \$3,750 in dividing the property, but he never learned her address. He knew that she had signed a deed in Philadelphia, but he said his last letter to her at her former address had been returned to him.

Judge Moran in the district court, granted the divorce decree on May 7th 1912.

1881 Census Queries.

We are trying to find the descendants of the following families listed in the 181 census returns. Can you help?

The first family were living in Hammersmith, London:

John Appleby aged 37 born Colchester, Essex (House Painter) and Mary Appleby aged 35 born Roydon, Essex, together with children John G. (12); Henry (10) Alice E. (5) and Annie L. (3)

Next we have a family living in Briton Ferry, Glamorgan:

Henry Appleby aged 44 born Sunderland, Durham (Railway Locomotive Superintendent) and Caroline (45) born Mile End, Middlesex together with their eight children: Kate (15); Charles S. (13), Alexander (11), Florence (10), Maud (8), Edwin (6) Francis (3) Madeline (1)

It is rare to find any Appleby's living in Scotland, but here is one living in West Greenock.

Edward Appleby aged 87 a rigger and widow born in Essex.

Next here is a family living in Byker Northumberland:

Richard Appleby aged 33 (Grain merchant) born in Newcastle-on-Tyne and his wife Margaret (29) from Beamish, Durham. Children were Harriet (9); Richard 98); Joseph (4); and Thomas (1)

Finally there is a family living in Hedleyhope, Durham.

Richard Appleby (29) a coal miner born in Osmotherley, Yorkshire and his wife Isabella (31) born in Tow Law, Durham. Their children are Ralph (11); George (9); John (4); Joseph William (2) and Robert (1 month)
