
The Apple Orchard is the newsletter of the Appleby Research Organisation.

John D. Appleby.

John Dorris Appleby, Justice of the Peace, of Dublin Township, Huntingdon County, Philadelphia, died Thursday, August 21st 1918, at his home.

He was the second son of William and Elizabeth Appleby and was born September 13, 1836, being therefore almost 82 years old. He lived his whole life in Dublin township, and followed the carpenter trade for many years.

He married Rachel Bennett Harper, of the same township, during the civil war. They reared a family of sons and daughters, - Mrs Dora Peterson, James A. Appleby both of Mt. Union; Miles of Newton Hamilton; _____ Speer (?) of Altoona; Janie, Mrs David Cree, at home. He had been a member of the Presbyterian church for sixty years. For many years he was the undertaker of the Shade Gap community. He was elected a Justice of the Peace many years ago, since which his daughter, Mrs Cree has kept his home and tenderly cared for him. The funeral will be held this Friday afternoon, followed by interment at Shade Gap.

Henry O. Appleby. This honoured and respected citizen of Columbia Township, Tuscola County, Michigan is a son of Odell and Eliza (Curtis) Appleby, who were natives of Dutchess County, New York., and he was born October 19, 1834, in Twinsburg, Summit County, Ohio. The parents were married in New York but migrated to Ohio about the year 1832 and bought one hundred and thirty-six acres of land, which the father improved and there they lived until his death. He was a prominent member of the society and influential in the Democratic party. He died about the year 1885 at the age of 72 and was long mourned as a useful and influential member of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Odell Appleby was twice married and the mother of our subject bore to him four children namely: William, Henry O., Mary and Hirum E. The second wife was known in her maidenhood as Hula Richardson and at the time of her marriage to Mr. Appleby she was the widow of Sherman Oviatt.

A common district school education was all that was furnished Henry Appleby as the family circumstances did not admit of his having further opportunities. At nineteen he began to learn the carpenter's trade and in the spring of 1869 he came to Michigan and settled 120 acres of land on section 16, Columbia Township. This property he has improved and put in under thorough tillage. He has made his own way in the world as he has not inherited wealth upon which to build. Continued on page 6...

The Appleby's of Kelloe

This family of Appleby's begins with the birth about 1740 at Kelloe in the County of Durham of one John Appleby who married Mary Davidson on the 18th May 1769 at Kelloe. When John did for an occupation is not known, but it could b assumed that he was either a coalminer or an agricultural labourer. John died 30th October 1803 at Penshaw but it is not known when Mary died.

They had six children, all born at Kelloe: Hannah, John, Thomas, James and William (twins) and Sarah.

Of these children it is Thomas born 1779 that we follow down the ancestral line

Thomas married on the 22nd September 1804 at Penshaw to Jane Simpson. The marriage took place at All Saints Church. The parish register shows that only two sons were born to Thomas and Jane at Penshaw and these were John born 11 January 1805 and William born 25 May 1806.

According to the 1841 census, Thomas and his new wife Elizabeth were residing at Burnmoor, so Jane must have died between 1806 and 1841. There is a reference to Thomas marrying an Elizabeth Marlow at Gateshead on the 2nd February 1818. It seems a possibility.

Of the two children of Thomas and Jane it is William we will now follow. It seems certain that William married three times and possibly four times. William was employed as a "Miner" and on the 11th May 1827 he married Jane Lee at Penshaw. There has been a theory put forward by other researchers that William was the son of John Appleby and Hannah Hall of Chester-le-Street or Birtley. However, at no

time during any of the census records from 1841-1891 did William even assert that he was born anywhere other than Penshaw or Burnmoor.

The registers of Penshaw parish were researched and the baptisms of William and his brother John were found proving he was the son of Thomas and Jane Simpson of Penshaw. According to the 1841 census William and Jane were residing in New Penshaw with their seven children, all born there.

Henry born 1830, Thomas born 1831, William born 1832, Joseph born 1834, John born 1836, James born 1838 and Jane born 1840 died young.

It appears that Jane the wife of William Appleby died between July and September 1843 at Penshaw. The next census of 1851 shows William married to a Margaret born about 1815 at Penshaw. This is where the puzzle about three or four wives rears its head.

This census shows them living at Penshaw Staithes with their children, with three more added to the family group although there is no mention of Jane (born 1840), so it must be assumed that she died as an infant. The three extra children born at Penshaw are: William Stout born 1841(step-son); Robson born 1849 (later referred to as Robinson) and Robert born 1850.

No-one has been able to trace any marriage for William and Margaret, but a marriage did take place in 1848 at Gateshead between William Appleby and Mary Ann Stout. People used nicknames a lot in those days e.g. Sarah-Sally, Margaret=Peggy, so it may be that this Mary was known as Margaret. If Margaret's surname was not Stout then it appears more than possible that William was married 4 times.

His marriage November 3, 1866, united him with Wealthy A. Richardson, who was born in Bedford, Ohio, and is the daughter of Godfrey and Anna (Taylor) Richardson, who came from Vermont to Ohio. Mr Richardson is a saddler by trade and had a family of nine children.

To Mr and Mrs Henry Appleby has been born one child whose name is Adelbert. This family has the esteem and good will of all who have come into business or social relations with them, as their character and life have been such as to yield them such a return, and their influence in the community has ever been for good. This gentleman's political views bring him into sympathy with the Democratic party with which he is ever ready to cast his vote.
