Old Bailey Proceedings 13th January 1688

Thomas Barlow and Oliver Morris of St. Giles's in the Field were indicted for entering the dwelling-house of **John Appleby** on the 12th December last, between seven and eight a clock at night, and stealing thence, one silk flowred Gown, value 40 shillings one quilted petticoat value 10 shillings, one crepe petticoat value 8 shillings a pair of satin stayes value 10 shillings and other goods of Ann Thomas; Nicholas North and Ann his wife, and Mary Simpworth.

Barlow and Morris being called to the Bar, to be arraigned upon the indictment, would not plead, upon which the sentence for remaining mute was read to them That he who stands mute and will not plead shall be put in the mean room and be laid naked upon the bare earth, but only something to cover his privy parts, his head and feet uncovered, one arm to be drawn to one quarter of the house with a cord and the other arm to another In the same manner shall be done his feet, and there shall be laid upon his body Iron and Stone so much as he can bear and more and shall drink of the water of the prison, except running water with three morsels of barley bread and this shall be his diet until he die. Yet they persisted obstinate and would not plead.

The sentence was read to them a second and a third time, at which time Barlow pleaded not guilty.

Another jury was sworn in at this time.

It appeared upon evidence that Barlow had confessed that he came up into Appleby's house and took away the Trunk wherein were the goods before mentioned and that Morris had staid in the street to receive the said goods.

Afterwards Morris was called up but remained mute upon which he was sent to be put in the press and after they had laid five half-hundred weights upon him he pleaded not guilty. The evidence was plain upon him and he being proved to have been burned in the hand before he was found guilty of Felony.

Appleby, Elizabeth Franklin of 13 Varden Road Battersea Surrey widow died 18 December 1903 Administration **London** to John James Appleby builder and contractor Effects £263 19s. 10d.

Appleby, Emma of 47 St George's Road Wimbledon Surrey (wife of Peter Appleby) died 10 October 1904 administration **London** 10 December to the said Peter Appleby rate-collector Effects £909 11s. 10d.

Appleby, George of 31 Taunton Road Lee Kent died 29 November 1904 at St John's Hospital Morden Hill Lewisham Kent Probate **London** 22 December to Mary Ann Appleby widow Effects £336 4s. 6d.

Appleby, Jeremiah of 25 Ashton Road Morecambe Lancashire warehouseman died 7 Sep 1904 Probate **Lancaster** 15 September to Robert Brockbank furniture dealer. Effects £ 177 1s 2d.

Appleby, Joseph of 80 Theaker lane Armley Leeds died 22 March 1904 Probate **Wakefield** 15 July to Ann Appleby widow William Appleby tin-plate-worker and William Mayne Keen cow-keeper Effects £583 16s. 3d.

Appleby, Lucy of "Bella Vista" Surrey road Bournemouth (wife of Robert Bew Appleby) died 23 September 1903 at Hordern road Wolverhampton Probate **London** 1 March to Albert Ernest Broadbent Appleby cycle-maker Effects £629 7s.

Become a newspaper Reporter.

When my parents were alive, the first page that my Mum looked at when the local paper arrived was that for the Family Announcements. Who had died? Who was getting married? And who were the couple with the new baby? I now find myself doing the self same thing. Perhaps it is something to do with reaching a certain age!

Newspapers contain a wealth of detail for the family historian, but most local papers are not on line, and if they are they don't normally have the full text indexes for name searching.

My local paper has approximately 20-25 family announcements each week and it doesn't take but a few seconds to check for the Appleby name.

I hope that you will agree that a project to encourage our members to check their local and/or national papers for any mention of Appleby's could result in significant benefit to everyone researching the Appleby name. That is why, today, we are officially launching our "Become a Newspaper Reporter" project.

What's Involved?

Each researcher agrees to check the announcements in their local or national newspaper for mentions of the name Appleby (or any of its variant spellings) Then scan or copy the entry and send it to The Appleby Research Organisation, Conifer House, George Street, Hintlesham, Ipswich, IP8 3NH. If you want to go further and look at all articles that's up to you.

We will include all entries received in "*The Apple Orchard*" and our *E-Newsletter*.

The project is entirely voluntary. If you can agree to check your local paper it will help other members, you will feel good and you may well find others help you too.

Ellen Appleby 1639-1655

James Dalley contacted us about a Burial Certificate that is in our library for Ellen Appleby who was buried at Newton-on Ouse Yorkshire in 1655. We were happy to send him a copy and to tell him that there was also a another document for Ellen aged nine in 1665, which seemed to complicate the matter.

However, James was able to clarify the situation. There were in fact two Ellen Appleby's. The one on the certified copy of burial died aged just 17 years, giving birth to her daughter who was named after her.

James also surprised us by saying that Ellen Appleby, who died in 1655 was the wife of Thomas APPLEBY of Linton-on-Ouse, and the daughter of Sir Thomas GASCOINE of Barnbow, near Leeds.

The death of Ellen APPLEBY in 1655 and the birth of her daughter Ellen are confirmed by the annals of an English Convent in Paris reproduced in a publication of the Catholic Record Society. (The English Benedictine Nuns of Paris, now in Colwich. Publication of the Catholic Record Society, 1911; 9:334-431)

Scarborough Appleby Family History Data

There may be a few mistakes made while making transcriptions so please try to check out any entries that are of interest to you. I have done my best in compiling these lists but if you do find any errors please let me know, and any gaps in the records I will endeavour to fill in on my next search.

The Gravestone Photographic Resource.

The gravestone photographic resource project was set up in 1998 in an attempt to provide a much need on-line resource for family historians.

The project aims are as follows:

- 1 to digitally photograph grave monuments worldwide
- 2 to extract all legible personal information
- 3 to publish all legible personal information on the internet –Free
- 4 to email copies of any grave monument image –Free

The project initially started in East Anglia, England where the creator Charles Sale was based, but is now a worldwide resource. Photographs are only for monuments for people who died before 1901.

There are a number of reasons who Charles decided to start this project:

- 1 there was not a central resource of grave monument images
- 2 information from grave monument images was not available for general access
- 3 every year more and more monuments are being lost for a variety of reasons such as weathering and vandalism
- 4 the information contained on a grave monument is often not available elsewhere.

The Last Will & Testament of William Appleby

Who died in Jackson County, Georgia, USA, in 1870

In the name of God amen I William Appleby of the County and State of Georgia being some (what) advanced in years but of good mind and memory through the mercy of God and knowing that I must die deem it right to make a disposition of the property with which a kind providence has bless me do make and ordain my last Will and Testament as follows:

Item 1st – I resign my body to the dust from whence it came my soul I trust will return to God who gave it.

Item 2nd – I desire that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid by my executors hereafter named.

Item 3rd – I desire and direct that all my property both personal and Real be kept and the place where I now reside or any other place I have moved to during my life by my beloved wife Elizabeth (S?) Appleby during her natural life and after her death to be sold by my Executors all except Mary also I wish her and her children all to be sold together at same time balance of my property and the proceeds that arise from the sale of all my property equally be divided among all of John B. Barnett Children that he has or may have by his present wife Martha Ann Barnett formerly Mary Ann Appleby

Item 4th I hereby nominate and appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth Appleby my Executrix and John D. Barnett my Executor to this my last Will and Testament this 25th January 1861 *Will Appleby (seal)* in the presence of us the subscribers who subscribe our names here to in the presence of the testator *P. F. Hinton; M. M. Pittman; A. S. Bennett*

This will was proved on the 6th April 1870 in Jackson County, Georgia.
