A Lesson to be learned...

Has your carefully researched Family Tree been purloined and misused by someone that you initially trusted?

One of the problems with the internet is that once data is out there, it is imposible to retrieve, and if you are not extremely wary your carefully researched facts could easily become someone else's fiction. Another is that incorrect data tends to multiply quite prolifically.

Have you ever come across the ancient occupation of "crayman"? No, neither have I until I was scanning through an on-line list of old trades. The funny thing was, when I read the description I suddenly realized the occupation described was that of "Drayman" — and it didn't take a genius to work out that Crayman was simply a typing error.

Amazingly this one typing error now appears in numerous lists of old occupations, each of them, I suspect derived from a single source, though probably not directly.

Read this: One day I was contacted by a man who claimed a relationship through my great-grandfather., so I let him look at my tree. The next thing I knew was that he had added my entire tree to his family tree, including people who he couldn't possibly be related to. I can not make him remove my tree from his and I get really annoyed when he continually pops up on my "Hot Matches"

My wife has a similar problem. Her ancestors are entirely English living as artisans in rural England, that is until an idiot in the USA added his American family to her tree.

The lesson to be learnt is that most of us only learn how risky it is to publish our trees on-line or exchange information with contacts when it is too late!

"Round about a Pound a Week."

A book which tells the plight of poor families in London around the time of the 1911 census. I was shocked by what I read about the poor, especially the way the homeless were treated.

"There were seven rooms in this abomination of a house. In six of the rooms, twenty-odd people, of both sexes and all aged, cooked, ate, slept and worked. In size the rooms averaged eight feet by eight, or possibly nine. — in the adjoining room lived a woman and six children. In another vile hole lived a widow, with an only son of sixteen who was dying of consumption."

I think I have identified the house as 10 Frying Pan Alley, Spitalfields where there were 25 people living at the time of the 1901 census. The seventh room was a sweatshop employing 5 men making boots – when there was any work available.

Southwark Story

Michael Barefoot found a reference to DOROTHY APPLEBEE in Florence Higham's book "Southwark Story" page 211

"Dorothy Applebee, wife of a brewer of Deadman's Place, the owner of the Queen's Head and a prominent figure in the vestry and the Borough... also left money to provide coal for the poor of Cure's College ... and a rent charge of £20 for an English School for thirty boys.. April 1682. Mr David Jenkins was appointed master of the intended school on the recommendation of Mrs Appleby.

The Appleby DNA Project.

And as a bonus you get to discover more about your own "deep ancestry" where your ancient ancestors came from hundreds and thousands of years ago. Were they Vikings from Denmark or Norway? Did they arrive with the Roman soldiers?

Item 1st. I resign my body to the dust from whence it came my soul I trust will return to God who gave it.

Item 2nd I desire that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid by my executors hereafter named.

Item 3rd. I desire and direct that all my property both personal and Real be kept and the place I now reside or any other place I have moved to during my life by my beloved wife Elizabeth Appleby during her natural life and after her death to be sold by my executors all except Mary also I wish her and her children all to be sold together at same time balance of my property and the proceeds that arise from the sale of all my property equally divided among all the children of John D. Barnett children that he has or may have by his present wife Martha Ann Barnett (formerly Martha Ann Appleby.

Item 4th I hereby nominate and appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth Appleby my executrix and John D. Barnett my Executor to this my last will and testament this 25th January 1861 *Will Appleby (seal)*
